By leave, the House agreed to the following provisions:

1. To allow the debate provisions for Second Reading of Specified Bills in sub-rule 2(10) to apply tomorrow, April 18, 2024, at the beginning of Orders of the Day, Government Business, instead of at 4:00 p.m. tomorrow.
2. To agree that only the following Specified Bills will be called for debate tomorrow, in this order: Bill 10, Bill 5, Bill 6, Bill 14, Bill 15, Bill 22, and Bill 23.
3. For the House to rise either following the Question being put and resolved on Second Reading of Bill 23, or 7:00 p.m., whichever is earlier, unless unanimous consent is granted to rise earlier or later.

The House resumed debate on the proposed motion of Hon. Mr. WIEBE:

THAT Bill (No. 30) – The Unexplained Wealth Act (Criminal Property Forfeiture Act and Corporations Act Amended)/Loi sur les richesses inexplicées (modification de la Loi sur la confiscation de biens obtenus ou utilisés criminellement et de la Loi sur les corporations), be now read a Second Time and be referred to a Committee of this House.

And the debate continuing,

And Mrs. COOK, Mr. WOWCHUK and Ms. STEFANSON having spoken,

And Mr. JOHNSON speaking at 5:00 p.m. The debate was allowed to remain in their name.

During the debate, Mrs. STONE rose on a matter of privilege alleging that the Honourable Minister of Justice displayed disrespectful behaviour in debate toward Ms. STEFANSON, violating their rights and the rights of other Members.
